CHICAGOS VS. BOSTONS.

BOSTON, Sept. 15.—The Chicagos scored their seventh consecutive victory over the Bostons to-day in the presence of 3,000 people. The game was very exciting and closely contested up to the sixth inning, but the visitors got on to Bradley's pitching the latter part of the game, and closed with a decided lead. The Chicagos lost the toss and took the bat. They were easily blanked in the first inning, but on the second they got in two runs on errors of Merrill and O'Rourke, and a safe hit by Hines. They added two earned runs in the third on the safe batting of Addy, Anson, McVey, and Peters. In the fifth Addy got his first on an error, stole second, and by fast base-running got home on Anson's safe hit. A three-base hit by White and a single by Hines earned a run in the sixth, and the eighth yielded another on the safe batting of Peters, followed by White's three-baser. In the ninth inning Spalding led off with a safe hit, but was thrown out by Leonard after making a wonderful running catch. Addy made a safe hit, and came home on a three-base hit of Barnes, who scored on Anson's hit. The Bostons failed to score until the third inning, when Bradley, with two men out, made a hard hit to center field, which bounded over Hines' head, and reached home on Barnes' high throw to White. In the fourth inning the Bostons made a good rally for the lead. Leonard led off with a safe hit. O'Rourke followed with a hard hit to right field, but was well thrown out at second by Addy. Leonard scored on Merrill's hit, and Manning's two-baser brought in another run. The Reds failed to hit Spalding with any effect after this, and were blanked the remaining innings. Daniels' umpiring was characterized by two or three wrong decisions, and the crowd showed their disapproval of the one against the home nine in a decided manner. Appended is
